From The Principal's Desk

I hope that this report finds our community well, at the middle of term two. There is a lot of activity happening in the school at the moment, both with regard to education and the infrastructure, all leading in to our semester one reporting period. It is a busy time indeed.

The first thing I would like to mention for my report was the school trip to Japan during the holidays. I understand there is a detailed article on this later in the newsletter but I want to mention it briefly myself. I was fortunate enough to accompany the students on the excursion and it was fantastic as the principal of our school, to experience Japan with our students. The behaviour of our students was exemplary and they all need to be commended. We had an amazing time seeing so many important cultural and physical features of the country. It was also amazing to visit our sister school Ube Senior High School and meet all of the staff and students first hand. To finish on this I would like to acknowledge the work of Mrs Fitzmaurice and Mrs Wagner for their work on the excursion and its implementation.

Our Athletics Carnival took place early this term. Over the two day carnival students and staff interacted and competed and the atmosphere was very positive and collegial. It is unusual for a comprehensive high school to have a two day carnival but due to the amount of student participation and the school spirit that is evident throughout the event, we just can't reduce the days. I would like to thank all of the staff for their support of the event, and in particular, Mrs Threadgate, for her organisation and commitment.

The transition for year seven 2019 is well underway. We have recently received our in zone enrolments as well as the expression of interest, for our out of zone enrolments. Our numbers are very strong for 2019 which is very positive for the school and community. The panel assigned to read and rank the out of zone enrolments will take place during week six of this term, and offers will be made at the end of the term, if we have any places available.

We recently had our 50th Anniversary Celebrations. We organised three separate events – a school assembly involving past staff and student speakers, a dinner for past students and staff and an open day on the weekend. All three events were very successful and I was so humbled by the community response. For our dinner we had over three hundred people attend and over one thousand people walked through our school during the open day. I would like to thank all of the staff as well as the anniversary committee for their support and organisation in each of the events.

I am sure that all of our community are now aware that we are in our new administration building on Lexington Parade. It is fantastic to be finally in the new space, and support our community and students in a much more appropriate position. I am now looking forward to refurbishing the old administration building in A Block as a much needed senior study space. I am hoping that this will be completed by the end of the year.

Finally, the reroofing of B, D and C Block is half way completed as I write this report. I am hoping that the building will be all complete by the middle of term three. At the moment we are compromising with room closures and restricted access across the site, however, the new roofing system will stop leaking in heavy rain as well as the constant drain blockages.

I would like to wish everyone all the best for the remainder of semester one and a restful break, when it comes.


SRC Report


Sport
