Maths

On 1 August this year Kotara entered 24 students into the Newcastle Mathematics Association 2019 Stage 5.1 Mathematics Competition. Overall we had excellent results especially for quite a challenging exam which had an average mark of less than 50%. Our group of 24 students achieved 5 distinctions, 10 credits and 7 passes which is fantastic. Special mention to Bailey Morgan who was our top performer who came fourth in the whole competition of 161 students.

On the same day, 115 students were involved with the Australian Mathematics Competition (AMC), an initiative coordinated by the Australian Mathematics Trust. The AMC is an engaging 30-problem competition that demonstrates the important and relevance of Mathematics in students' everyday lives. Our students earned 6 Distinctions, 20 Credits and 89 Proficients and Participations, an excellent result. AMC awards will be presented at year group assemblies and the final presentation assembly.

Careers

This term has been a busy one for Careers. A number of our students have been offered a school - based apprenticeship or traineeship (SBAT).

- Olivia Inja will undertake a Cert III Business Administration through the NAB branch at Kotara.
- Oliver Zienius Cert II in Warehousing at Reece Plumbing Kotara and
- Liam Hoskins Cert II in Warehousing at Reece Plumbing Wallsend.

KFC is also looking to put on some of our students through their SBAT program. This is a wonderful opportunity as not only do the students gain a nationally recognised qualification but the work skills and experience obtained could lead to a permanent full time and part time positions.

I was fortunate to recently attend a morning tea at Newcastle Tafe to celebrate the graduation of the students completing the SBAT in Nursing through Hunter New England Health. Year 12 student, Emily Keogh, was one of these students. She enjoyed the SBAT program which has armed her with skills for a future career in Health should she choose to pursue

that area. Congratulations to these students.



On 18 Novmber a group of students went to City Hall to participate in a 'Skills and Thrills Showcase', which gave them a valuable insight into the industries that are expanding and seeking skilled workers for the future. These included Hospitality, Aged Care, Child Care, Construction, Retail and Transport and Logistics. Various pathways and opportunities were presented to the students and representatives from VET industries addressed the students.

Mitch Maguire from Novaskill visited the school to speak with students interested in apprenticeships and traineeships. He explained the role of Novaskill in the apprenticeship and traineeship process. Students were able to ask questions and those who attended found it very worthwhile.

Congratulations must go to Cyrus Park Brisbin who has been successful in obtaining a \$5000 scholarship from MBA for students who undertake the Construction course in years 11 and 12. He will be assisted through work experience programs, uniforms and Personal Protective Equipment (PPE) as well as assistance to meet travel and general expenses.

KHS has students attending the Youth Engagement Strategy (YES) program through Tafe. This program offers the students a taste of some of the courses that Tafe offer. They usually run twice a year – one in term 2 and again in Term 4. The students attending have enjoyed the program.

Many students have undertaken work experience throughout the term. Some have done block work while others have done one per week. Please see Mrs McPherson or Mrs Atkins for information on pursuing work experience options.

To ensure effective student transition from primary to secondary school we have undertaken several transition sesions where students have had the opportunity to meet their future classmates and Teachers, Deputy Principal and Year Adviser. Students also visited important places around the school such as the library and school canteen and had the opportunity to participate in some fun and engaging lessons.



Auslan Awareness

Every week during the Wednesday Assembly, KHS Students are taught a new Auslan sign by two of our deaf and hard of hearing students from the Support Faculty. Auslan is the official sign language of the Australian Deaf Community.



Mrs Dani Norton (Hearing Support Class SLSO) has been raising awareness of Auslan with our SLSO and SASS staff by having regular signing sessions. Our SLSO's and SASS staff are feeling more confident in their abaility to communicate with our deaf and hard of hearing students.

This year the Learning and Support Teachers (LaSTs) have been:

- working with the year 7 students in targeting literacy and numeracy groups which have shown success in helping to build on the foundations of their learning.
- Every Tuesday and Thursday morning running a Homework Program for students to access additional support for class content and homework tasks
- Organised in school and external Disability Provisions for students who require additional support for assessment tasks
- Facilitate the Minimum Standards testing for Year
 10 & Year 11 students
- Run a SWAN transition group to enable Year 6 students to transition to High School with ease.

We have had a busy and successful year and look forward to working with all students next year. We would love to see more students attend the Homework Program on a Tuesday & Thursday morning between 8am and 9am in the library.
